

This circular walk (approx. 2.5 miles/4 km) leads through recently planted woodland at Pound Farm and the fields and woods of Parham's Oak Farm to retrace a vivid moment in England's history.

A living, working landscape, this time-honoured countryside has many secrets to share:

- Walk the very route taken by Mary Tudor in July 1553, leading her loyal army of thousands on her famous journey from Framlingham Castle to London to claim the English throne.
- Learn about the ancient form of woodland management known as 'coppicing' which is still being practised in Queen Mary's Wood today.
- Find out how village school children sowed acorns to create Queen Mary's Plantation in Victorian times.


